Wellness Squad Tip of the Month:

• Remember that breakfast is the first meal of the day and it needs to be a good one. Your breakfast should be rich in complex carbohydrates and proteins to perk up your metabolism. Breakfast has also been shown to reduce work-related fatigue and weight gain.

If you think that you don't have time for breakfast, try prepping some overnight oats the night before. Overnight oats are a no-cook method of making oatmeal. Instead of cooking your oats on the stove or in the microwave, you mix oatmeal with your liquid of choice and other mixins, and then let it rest in the refrigerator overnight.

In the morning, you have a pudding-like porridge that is perfect for an easy grab-and-go breakfast. Here is a basic recipe, but it can be modified a near infinite number of different ways. A quick Google search yields hundreds of recipes online.

1/3 cup vanilla Greek yogurt
1/2 cup old fashioned oats
2/3 cup unsweetened milk of choice
1 tablespoon ground chia seeds or ground flax seeds
A pinch of salt
1/4 cup raisins
INSTRUCTIONS
Mix all ingredients together in a Mason jar.
Close and refrigerate for at least four hours, but preferably overnight
before eating
This makes one large serving or two small servings

Approximately 410 calories for the full recipe above

Did You Know?
