### Strengthening Partnerships:

 A group of 12 volunteers working with CSC's Share The Vision peer mentor program participated in training on Tuesday, June 9<sup>th</sup>. The training was conducted by Share the Vision Coordinator Moreed Kamal, Manager of Social Services Jim Hlavaty and Nicole Clevenger of Case Western Reserve University's Center for Evidence-Based Practices (CEBP).

Share The Vision volunteers are individuals who are blind or have low vision and provide peer counseling by phone to CSC clients who have experienced a recent onset of blindness or vision loss. Most Share The Vision clients are older adults who have limited incomes and few resources. Volunteers help clients understand how to use CSC and community resources to achieve independence and full participation in their family and community despite their vision loss.

The participants voiced enthusiasm for the opportunity to learn skills that will help them as Share The Vision volunteers. Additional training continues on Monday, August 3<sup>rd</sup>.

 Cleveland Clinic's Cole Eye Institute is preparing for their first Argus II retinal implant surgery. As part of the preparation, several CSC staff members participated in a training conference provided by staff of Second Sight Medical Products, Inc. of Sylmar, California, the manufacturer of the Argus II retinal prosthesis. ### From the Consumer Council:

• Question: Are businesses allowed to charge a cleaning fee to customers who have service animals?

Answer: No. Businesses cannot ask or require an individual with a disability to pay cleaning fees, even if people with pets are required to pay these fees. Service animals are not pets. If you normally charge individuals for the damage they cause, you may charge an individual with a disability for damages caused by his or her service animal. Service animals must be housebroken and under the control of the owner at all times.

- Consumers on Supplemental Security Income (SSI) can receive a Computers for the Blind computer for \$40 through a grant from the Delta Gamma Foundation.

<u>Computers for the Blind</u> (CFTB) a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization located in Richardson, TX is pleased to announce the receipt of a generous grant from the Delta Gamma Foundation to provide 75 accessible desktop computers and monitors for \$40 to persons who are on SSI due to their blindness. The regular fee for a desktop is \$110. Laptops are \$160.

These refurbished computers come installed with the following accessibility software:

- NVDA Screen Reader <u>www.nvda-project.org/</u>
- o JAWS Screen Reader www.freedomscientific.com, (FS) trial version
- Licensed copy of MAGic w/out speech Screen Magnification software valued at \$395 by FS
- TypeAbility Typing Tutorial, <u>www.yesaccessible.com</u>, trial version
- Larger monitors for those with low vision

Shipping is free and computers are generally mailed within one week of receipt of \$40 check and award letter from the Social Security Administration (SSA) showing proof of SSI based on blindness.

CFTB also received a grant from the Delta Gamma Foundation to provide 25 TypeAbility Typing Tutorial licenses for \$25.00 each for CFTB consumers. These retail for \$150 and are normally available to CFTB consumers for \$50.00. To obtain a license, contact YesAccessible. Consumer will need to send them a check for \$25, a copy of their award letter from the SSA showing proof of SSI based on blindness, and their CFTB ID number found in "my documents" on their CFTB computer. <u>www.yesaccessible.com</u>, **626-358-5750**, <u>info@yesaccessible.com</u>.

Please note that consumers must choose between the computer grant and the TypeAbility Grant. Finally, only SSI recipients are eligible for the grants, not SSDI recipients.
